First, the November 14th meeting minutes were approved.

Second, the Division approved the HUMDIV Shared Governance Resolution.

Third, the Division considered two discussion items, including a General Education proposal from the (not quite official) Washburn Chapter of the AAUP and new revisions to the CAS Third-year Review procedure, timeline, and review forms. The following responses were provided.

Regarding the AAUP General Education proposal, one question posed was whether the Provost's office had been contacted about the possible repercussions or unforeseen challenges that adopting such a policy might create. A suggestion to ask Jennifer Ball for general feedback was shared. Another set of questions regarding the document's creation and direction was brought forth. Namely, were the authors of this document representative of the campus population and units? What is the overall objective of this document (i.e., is it policy? Is it recommended guidelines?)? What process would this document need to follow next to achieve the authors' overarching objective? What is HUMDIV being asked to do with this document at this time? In short, the questions sought to clarify what the document is, how it was created, what it's trying to achieve, and what the next steps would be.

Regarding the Third-year Review procedure, Division members did not indicate concerns to the collective body at this time.

On December 4th, 2023, Ian Smith announced via e-mail that a quorum was not achieved. The meeting was extended to December 5th to meet quorum. On December 6th, 2023, Ian Smith announced via e-mail that agenda items 1 and 2 were approved with a quorum.

First, the November 17th – December 5th meeting minutes were approved.

Second, the Division was granted a discussion window (February 5th-12th) regarding the proposed Bachelor of General Studies degree. One comment (see following paragraph) emerged during this discussion window.

The "parachute option" of the BGS is for students, "[...] who pursue a more traditional degree at Washburn and then decide that degree is not the right fit for them." For such students, "[t]his proposed degree provides a broad educational experience that is customizable to a student's career objectives or academic interests."

The potential benefits to the University and students could come at considerable cost to individual academic programs.

There are three primary routes by which this can occur:

- 1. Where career considerations are a factor, the proposal is clearly premised on the assumption that prospective employers will look no less favorably on the BGS than degrees including a major. Indeed, the selling point for any BGS-wielding student is precisely that it was customized for subsequent employment. Thus, for any student finding that their degree is 'not the right fit for them,' in terms of their new-found career objectives, integrity demands that we advise them to 'parachute' out of our programs at the expense of our respective programs' graduation-rates.
- 2. Where students find that their degree is 'not the right fit for them,' in terms of their academic interests, exactly the same concerns as above, arise for faculty.
- 3. Some students fail to finish a major because they find one or two classes too challenging. Under the current guidelines, there's no cooling-off period. A student can simply withdraw from a major, return the next semester and graduate with a BGS by taking much easier classes. Unlike the previous two scenarios, faculty

won't be required to work directly against the success of their own programs, but the same outcome will occur: the program will suffer from a lower graduationrate.

In all three scenarios, the proposal pits the success of the University and its students against that of its constitutive programs.

Although contested, the BGS action item was approved with 18 yeas, 6 nays, and 1 abstention.

Third, all remaining action items (3-9) were approved by the division.

On February 19, 2024 at 2:24 PM (Central), Ian Smith announced via e-mail that all action items were approved by HUMDIV with a quorum. Ian also encouraged the division to provide nominations for commencement speaker by Thursday, February 22nd.

The meeting concluded on February 19th at 2:00 PM (Central).
