

## REASONABLE ACCOMMODATIONS FOR STUDY ABROAD

Washburn University offers numerous opportunities for students to participate in Study Abroad programs. Students with disabilities who request academic accommodations for Study Abroad programs must follow the procedures for requesting reasonable accommodations. It is very important that students needing accommodations plan well in advance, minimally 8 weeks before the start of the program. Students must work with the appropriate disability coordinator, WU Office of International Programs and the prospective international institution. Please note that all requests for services and accommodations must be supported by the documentation on file and be reasonable and appropriate within the limits set forth by state and federal law and University procedure. The University will make efforts to assist students with finding reasonable accommodations to participate in the program. The accommodations cannot fundamentally alter the nature of a course or program of study or present an undue hardship for either Washburn University or the host institution.

Although many countries are becoming more aware of the needs of people with disabilities, not all countries have similar laws and accessible infrastructure/services. Consequently, requests which may be reasonable in a domestic context may not fall into that category in the international context in light of available resources. The following recommendations are for students to consider when contemplating study abroad:

1. Research possible accommodations in other countries such as accessible housing, public transportation, assistive technology, etc.
2. Research alternative study abroad options in countries where appropriate accommodations may be more readily available.
