

Analysis and Reporting Calendar

Data are collected and analyzed for each PSLO (1-3) annually.

Both, the University Assessment and the CoARC Report on Current Status (RCS) is due each year on June 30th.

Stakeholder Involvement

The communities of interest served by the program include, but are not limited to, students, graduates, faculty, college administration, employers, physicians, and the public. An Advisory Board, with representation from each of the above communities of interest (and others as determined by the program), meet with key personnel twice a year (fall & spring) to assist program and university personnel in their evaluation of the curriculum, program outcomes, technical standards and program response to change, and to consider the addition of competencies, processes, and policy.

Faculty members (there are two) use assessment data to identify deficient areas. If an area is identified, we work with our advisory board to develop or approve an action plan. Our advisory board consists of the primary stakeholders, as mentioned above and more precisely here - the local hospital representatives, Co-Medical Directors (both board certified in Critical Care, Pulmonology, and Sleep Medicine), a member of the community, graduates, a student representative, Department Chair, and a representative from the Dean's office. After discussing a proposed or suggested change, we would then implement, revise, or discard our action plan based on input from the advisory board.

If an action plan were implemented, we would visit with students and our clinic sites (the hospital stakeholders) to collect anecdotal and performance feedback. Obviously, our subsequent annual assessments will aid us in determining if our plan was successful and effective, and on the right track.



All assessment data for our program is shared with our advisory committee, which consists of our program's main stakeholders twice a year. The public, alumni, and current and prospective students can access our outcomes for the Commission on Accreditation of Respiratory Care (CoARC) on the program's web page. The CoARC link is at the bottom of the page. Our university PSLO's tightly aligned with our profession's accrediting body (CoARC). The university provides a link to program (or HLC) outcomes on the university's website. There is also a link on the program's web page along with the link to our professional accreditor's data.

Again, data is shared annually with prospective students - via our website or during a scheduled meetings. Current students are provided this information during a classroom meeting or via our website.

Our professional accrediting body (CoARC) requires an annual Report on Current Status (RCS), so they have already determined that we have or haven't met their outcomes to have a program. The public can access the information from our program's website or via CoARC's website. The program faculty, advisory committee, school, and university assessment committees are provided a review of our assessment data annually.

The Program Director is responsible for overseeing necessary adjustments to curriculum.

Program Assessment Plan Review Cycle

The Program Assessment Plan is reviewed annually.

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
