




“Every Experience Matters”

He was a Sibberson Award finalist for the School of Applied Studies. He also earned a Master of Public Health degree which is offered jointly from Bowling Green State University and the University of Toledo in 2012, and an Associate of Science in Radiologic Technology from Mercy College of Northwest Ohio in 2008. Moore is currently the Program Director of Imaging Sciences and Program Director of the Bachelor of Health Science in Medical Imaging programs at Mercy College of Ohio.

He completed his clinicals at Blanchard Valley Health System which was the beginning of a successful future for him. “Washburn helped me enter the workforce, without the school and program, I would not be where I am at today. I was very fortunate to secure my first professional role with Schneider & Wuest, Inc. as a Medical Dosimetrist as a direct result of my clinical placement at Blanchard Valley Health System,” said Moore. “The Best Fit For You”



Hannah Hagedorn is a Senior who will be graduating this summer with two degrees: a Bachelor of Criminal Justice with an emphasis in Forensic Investigations and a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology. She has been very involved on campus including the Leadership Institute, Peer educator in Mabee Library in the Prior Learning and Testing Office, Residential Advisor, Criminal Justice Association, Kansas Correctional Association, and helped start the Forensics Science Club. Her internship was not in Forensics, as her focus changed when she realized that Corrections was closer to what she wanted to do in criminal justice after a study abroad trip to Scotland. On this trip she learned about Scotland’s rehabilitative programs for inmates. She developed a strong passion for helping others

and hopes to be part of making these programs work more efficiently in America. She interned at Shawnee County Department of Corrections in their programming and re-entry department, where she facilitated classes for the female inmates. The curriculum includes Money Matters, which teaches foundational skills about money management, budgeting, and bills. Another class called Decision Points, is a cognitive psychology program built on changing thought processes. Inmates learn to take a risky behavior and look at it in a different way, to make decisions, and also to think a full thought before reacting. She was also involved in mediation training here at Washburn which helped her to learn the legal side of criminal justice and the basics of mediation in conflict resolution.

Hagedorn’s advice to future students: “Volunteer and take all of the extra classes that you can. I was dead set on Forensic Investigations until I took Serial Killers which taught about the interactions with people and I realized I wanted to focus on the people side of things. Be open minded; the career you came in wanting may not be what you end up doing. Take internships early; these opportunities help you understand what is the best fit for you after school.” She would like to start her future career in programming and re-entry or case management, while learning more about justice reform. She hopes that one day all inmates would go into some type of re-entry program because they offer valuable skills and lessons that they may have missed out on before they were inmates.

SAS Alumni Fellow

Kimberly Rieger was recently honored as the School of Applied Studies Alumni Fellow. An Alumni Fellow is a Washburn alumni who has distinguished themselves in their career. Each year in the fall, the Washburn University Alumni Association recognizes alumni from each academic unit with this honor. Rieger received a Master of Criminal Justice (MCJ) with an emphasis in Corrections Administration from Washburn University and a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science with a minor in Criminology from the University of Oklahoma. Rieger currently serves as the Chief United States Probation Officer for the District of Maine. She also serves the Federal Courts as a national trainer and subject matter expert, and has received commendation from the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts for her work with their agency.



Rieger began her career with the United States District Court for the District of Kansas in 1999. After serving the District of Kansas, she moved to the Western District of Oklahoma where she was named the Deputy Chief United States Probation Officer for the Western District of Oklahoma. During her years in Oklahoma she served on the Board of Directors of New View Oklahoma, an agency serving the visually impaired, and the Board of Directors for the Oklahoma Women's Coalition. Rieger also served as the alumnae advisor for Delta Gamma at the University of Oklahoma from 2010-2014, where she was honored as the Outstanding Panhellenic Advisor. She was president of the Norman Delta Gamma Alumnae Chapter and in 2016 was honored as the Oklahoma City Panhellenic Association's Woman of the Year. Rieger is a graduate of the Norman, Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce Leadership program and the Federal Judicial Center's Leadership Development program.

She has taught as an adjunct instructor at Washburn for the Criminal Justice and Legal Studies Department. Rieger was featured as a criminal justice professional in the textbook Probation, Parole and Community Based Corrections. She credits the MCJ program for contributing to her successful career. "An advanced degree is crucial to compete for federal law enforcement positions and advancement within your agency. The graduate degree that I earned at Washburn has been instrumental in advancing my career. I would not be where I am today without my master's degree," Rieger said.

Jacquetta (Nikki) Ramirez-Jennings graduated this spring with a Bachelor of Applied Science in Human Services with an emphasis in Integrative Practice. She had always known she wanted a career that gave her the opportunity to build relationships, advocate for those in need, and serve the Topeka community. The Human Services program fit her need to gather, love, lead, and launch others, especially those who are marginalized and oppressed. Ramirez-Jennings is a non-traditional student but always felt that Washburn was the right fit from day one. The availability of online and evening classes allowed her to work and provide for her young family. She said, “All of the classes I had throughout my academic career with Washburn have been fun and engaging! I recall

always looking forward to the discussions with my instructors and peers in my seated classes and online. I knew my opportunity was a privilege and while I did enjoy the journey, I also took it very seriously. One of my favorite memories of Washburn will be the friendships made, the knowledge obtained, and knowing that my instructors genuinely wanted me to be successful.”

She completed an internship with Topeka Public Schools at Eisenhower Middle School. At this internship, she learned about functioning with a mindset of the pronoun narrative of “we”. The idea behind this mindset is to approach life with others and not just for others which allows everyone to win. She currently serves as Club Director with the Boys & Girls Club of Topeka - Adams Unit. She has been enjoying her time there and the opportunity it provides to build relationships and make a difference and an impact on the Club members, their families, staff, and the Topeka Community. Her advice for current students: “Count it ALL as joy, love people where they are at, and always take time for self-care.”

“Step Out of Your Comfort Zone”

Alumni Chelsie Wilson graduated in fall 2018 with a Bachelor of Applied Science in Human Services with an emphasis in Integrative Practice. She also completed Certificates in Non-Profit Management and Trauma & Recovery Services. She was a member of Phi Kappa Phi Honors Society and a Sibberson Award finalist for the School of Applied Studies. Although Wilson’s parents are Washburn alumni, her decision to come here was based on small class sizes and “It was a school that truly cared about the success of each student, encouraged students to get involved, created connections with peers, and helped explore their interests. It truly felt like a place to call home,” she said.



During her time in the Human Services program, Wilson completed two internships at the Topeka Rescue Mission: in the Children’s Palace, and in the Doxazo Ministries department, and a third internship at Kansas Children’s Service League in the Post-Adoption Resource Center. Wilson credits her education for her first full-time position. The Topeka Rescue Mission offered her a position as a Classroom Assistant in the Children’s Palace. “The Children’s Palace is an early childhood education center for children whose families currently or formerly reside at the Topeka Rescue Mission Homeless Shelter. A unique aspect of the Children’s Palace is that we operate from a trauma-informed approach known as Trust-Based Relational Intervention (TBRI). Due to the history of trauma many of the children have experienced, TBRI is implemented into every facet of our program,” said Wilson. She believes her education prepared her for this position by offering classes on the effects of trauma on the brain, symptoms of trauma, and various other trauma-related topics.

Wilson’s advice for future students: “Take advantage of the opportunity to explore your interests and step out of your comfort zone. Although internships can require a lot of energy and time, they will benefit you tremendously if you are intentional in your role. Going above and beyond with the tasks you are given, seeking out constructive criticism from supervisors, and being teachable will help you walk away with valuable experiences and connections that you can use going forward in your education and career.”

“Develop My Voice”



Molly Manske is a Senior in the Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) program. She chose to attend Washburn because she knew her voice would be heard, she wanted to have strong relationships with the professors, and wanted to get to know all the other students in her major. Her father was a former criminal justice professor at Washburn and he raved about the education that is provided to students. After coming to campus, Manske was impressed by how easy it was to get involved in campus activities. She decided to jump right in as a member of the Delta Gamma sorority and has held a leadership position all three years. She is also involved in Young Life, Spanish club, and Bod squad. “By getting involved early on at Washburn, I was able to develop my voice and leadership

that has aided my success as a Social Work student and individual as a whole. I apply my Social Work knowledge in all aspects of my life, including my leadership in other organizations. I believe by getting involved at your university, it makes you a more educated and well-rounded student and individual,” said Manske.

Her future career goals involve working as an international social worker who advocates for children’s rights. She loves to travel and is minoring in Spanish as a way to enhance her communication skills. Manske participated in the recent study abroad trip to Colombia in fall 2018. This trip allowed her to see how social work knowledge from the United States applies to situations all around the world. Her advice for future students: “Be proud of your major. Not everyone has what it takes to be a social worker. Social Work is an incredible field to study and provides students with knowledge that goes beyond Social Work in general and focuses on developing students into culturally competent individuals. Social Work changes lives every day and continuously works for change in our society that benefits the overall lives of people who need it most.” After she completes the BSW, Manske plans to continue her education in the Master of Social Work (MSW) program.

“Truly Dedicate Yourself”

Maria Wellman graduated this spring with a Bachelor of Social Work (BSW). She was President of the BSW Student group and a member of the Phi Alpha Honor Society. Wellman chose social work as a major after meeting with the acting program manager for the Transitional Care Management (TCM) Program at the Topeka VA. The idea of linking those in need with resources for transition, whether it be through a traumatic event or another life altering occurrence, really resonated with her as something she could succeed at doing. She was able to apply this to her practicum at Douglas County Correctional Facility. During the fall, she attended the study abroad trip to Colombia. Wellman discussed what she learned during that trip: “I was exposed to a variance in all aspects; culture, language, politics, environment cuisine, and conflict. We attended talks with university professors and survivors of the trauma that accompanies the armed conflict in the region. This conflict surrounds the restitution of lands that had been taken by paramilitary groups during past events and continues to pose violent outcomes in returning these lands to their original owners. Some members of the community were hopeful for change, while others were distrustful of the government after all of the violence that was allowed.”

“Sembrandopaz, the host agency, is a very trusted agency by many in the community and other surrounding areas. Their employees and volunteers encourage and teach others to be self-sustaining and they host a number of different support groups for those affected by the violence. I was astounded that an entire population so accustomed to the violence they experienced could be so welcoming and attentive to “outsiders”. Though many had lost family, their homes, or both, they wanted to share their stories with us,” Wellman said.

Her advice to future students: “Truly dedicate yourselves to what you are doing. One of the challenges I have run into in my practicum year is that I became overwhelmed, taking away from my practicum experience. If I were to do it again, I would give my practicum its own academic year so that I could really apply myself to that environment.” Wellman hopes to continue working in correctional facilities and bring the experiences she learned in her practicum to encourage re-entry and programming case management services to facilities that do not already have them.



“Get Involved!”



D'Mya Valdivia graduated from Washburn Tech's Early Childhood Education certificate program in 2016 and from Shawnee Heights High School in 2017. She decided to pursue the Early Childhood Education certificate program because she loves children. She didn't plan to be teaching and making lesson plans but that is what the program involves and she ended up liking it. She still uses her certificate at her current job at the University Child Development daycare. The

program at WUTech helped her succeed at this job by teaching her how to create lesson plans and execute what was planned.

She choose to continue her education at Washburn as she is from Topeka and wanted to live at home. Another reason was the discounted tuition rate to complete an Associate degree through a program the School of Applied Studies offers to WUTech students. Valdivia found out about this program from Mitch Higgs at SAS. “Transferring from WUTech to Washburn was fairly easy and Mitch was very helpful so I was not blindsided by anything,” she said.

Valdivia completed an Associate of Arts in Human Services in fall 2019 and is now pursuing a Bachelors degree. She has taken full advantage of the opportunities that Washburn has available to be involved on campus. She is a member of the Black Student Union, a Student Ambassador, a Peer Educator, a Summer Orientation Counselor (SOC), and a Linc Bonner Scholar. Her advice to current students: “Get involved! All I have done on campus has allowed me to learn a lot about myself and others. I think it definitely enhances your education and when else are you going to have the time to do these kind of activities once you get out into the real world? Also, Washburn is a community that wants to help you and they want you to succeed so if you need help don't be afraid to reach out to someone and they can get you to the right place.” She is still early in her college career and is debating her numerous options for the future including continuing her education past a Bachelors degree.
