Analysis and Reporting Calendar

Data for all PSLOs are collected every semester that AN324 and AN490 are taught. Typically, AN324 run every spring semester. AN490 is a new capstone course and has not yet run, but will be taught every fall semester beginning in Fall 2023. PSLOs 1, 3, and 4 will only be reported in even number AY years (e.g., 2021-2022) and PSLOs, 2 and 5 will only be reported in odd number AY years (e.g., 2022-2023).

Stakeholder Involvement

1) Full Time Anthropology Faculty (FTAF): All FTAF are involved at every step of the assessment process, from the creation of PSLOs and assessment plan to analyzing assessment results. ATAF review the assessment process each year in the Fall and have an end-of-the-year meeting in Spring to plan check in. The Program Assessment Plan is reviewed by all FTAF every other year.

2) Part Time Anthropology Faculty (PTAF): IN AY 2021-2022, there were no PTAF. However, in previous years, PTAF almost exclusively taught100-level general education courses. PTAF discuss the importance of course, general education, and program assessment with the department chair when hired as well as the process we use as a program. The 100-level courses all have assessment plan documents that outline how to teach and evaluate the course. In addition, PTAF meet with the course general education assessment coordinator (e.g. AN112= Dr. Jason Miller) to discuss how assessment works in the course and answer any questions. PTAF are regularly consulted (at least once a year) for feedback about their courses and assessment.

3) Students: In classes in which PSLOs are assessed, the specific PSLO are noted in the syllabus. Advisors
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discuss the importance of and rationale for taking courses in order (curricular map) with students regularly during advising appointments and when meeting majors at NSO and TSO days. Students complete an exit survey when they graduate where they are able to provide feedback regarding the program including curriculum and assessment. In addition, we discuss program changes with students at at least one student club meeting each year (usually fairly early in the Fall semester). We also share this information with students at the "Major Meetup" in the fall for incoming students.

4) CAS/University: FTAF attend assessment trainings on campus to maintain best practices and have applied and received several C-TEL Assessment grants to improve program and course assessment strategies. They solicit feedback from college and university stakeholders through the annual reporting process.

5) Broader Community: Our assessment plan and report are posted on our departmental website under "Quality Indicators." The Facebook page for the department is open for public comment and allow for student and community feedback on the program. Facets of program assessment, including assignments linked to the PSLOs are highlighted on these public pages. Our departmental newsletter is sent to all current faculty, students, and alumni and is also posted on the two aforementioned Facebook pages and department website twice each year. We are also in communication with career-path stakeholders and community collaborators (e.g., the Kansas State Historical Society) about our program and what these stakeholders are looking for in graduates of our program.
