The Sociology program committee, which consisted of full time sociology faculty (Dr. Ibanez, Mr. Myers, and Dr. Park) and the department chair (Dr. Sundal), received the CTEL Assessment Grant #22AS09 in spring 2022. Our accomplishments include the following:

3. Revised degree requirements = reduced the number of required classes from 8 to 5 so that students can tailor their curriculum to their education and career goals with greater flexibility in the upper-division sociology elective credits

- 4. Created a Sociology Senior Capstone course
- 5. Revised the Sociology Curriculum Map
- 6. Reviewed the target threshold measurements
- 7. Created and administered the Sociology Senior Exit Survey
- 8. Finalized department protocols to gather, store, and report program assessment data
- 9. Created program assessment reporting calendar and rotation plan for assessment liaisons
- 10. Updated requirements for department honors

Overall Recommendations

While the Sociology program committee accomplished a lot of work this past academic year, we need to finalize the course approval form, and associated direct assessment measures and rubrics, for the new Sociology Senior Capstone course. The Sociology program committee and department chair will tackle these

remaining items at the department annual retreat in August so that our program and curriculum changes can make it through the university governance approval process in AY2022-23.

We will also communicate our program and assessment changes to internal (e.g., department faculty, Social Science division faculty, majors, and minors) and external stakeholders. We will report Sociology revisions in our department newsletter, social media pages, and website. In addition, we will create 1-page briefs that summarize our program assessment changes to distribute to internal and external stakeholder while eliciting their feedback.

Overall Reflection

The Sociology program committee is pleased with our program and curricular changes and look forward to implementing, collecting, and analyzing the data.

Faculty Collaboration

The current Sociology assessment liaison, Dr. Mary Sundal (department chair) collaborated with the full time Sociology faculty (Dr. Lindsey Ibanez, Mr. Alex Myers, and Dr. Sangyoub Park) during a day-long assessment retreat in spring 2022 to accomplish the aforementioned assessment goals. This work was funded by the CTEL Assessment Grant. The Sociology program committee will communicate the assessment revisions to the remaining department faculty and faculty in the Social Science Division in the upcoming academic year.

Communication & Collaboration with Students

The department and faculty advisors keep students informed and up-to-date on program and assessment practices throughout students' academic careers here at Washburn. Beginning at the first introduction to the program during NSO, TSO, or campus visits, faculty advisors discuss the Sociology mission statement, PSLOs, curriculum map (and related major map) and how the program will share assessment results with students (e.g., department website, newsletter, and student club meetings). Faculty reinforce this information during routine advising appointment with majors as well. Faculty also incorporate the PSLOs into all required courses from the Introduced level to the Reinforced level so that students are aware how their courses, and course-based assignments, are aligned in the program. Finally, the program values student feedback to improve our assessment practices, thus, we anonymously survey students prior to graduation (senior exit survey) so that we can review and potentially implement students' suggestions in future semesters.

Communication & Collaboration with External Stakeholders

The Sociology assessment plan and findings are shared with external stakeholders in a few ways. First, we post

Communication & Collaboration with University

The current assessment liaison, Dr. Mary Sundal, applied for and was awarded the CTEL Assessment Grant to complete, along with the full time Sociology faculty, the Sociology program assessment changes in AY2021-22. Dr. Sundal is also part of the program assessment committees for the two Anthropology programs and has received CTEL Assessment Grants (along with the full time Anthropology faculty). All three department programs share information among faculty and committees regarding best assessment practices.

The Sociology program committee members have numerous CAS and university service positions where they are able to discuss assessment and engage in meaningful conversations about assessment as well.

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
