Friday, October 21, 2022

I. Meeting called to order at 2:02 pm by Division Chair Seid Adem.

II. Minutes of the previous NSD meeting (09/09/2022) were approved as circulated.

III. Committee Reports

A. Advisory enrollment management committee (tentative):

- a. The new director of enrollment, Alan Bearman, will utilize an advisory committee (from the faculty handbook) for enrollment management instead of forming a new committee. This topic will be clarified in the upcoming Faculty Senate meeting.

IV. Old Business – none.

V. Discussions –

A. Program Change Form: Eliminate the 84–credit hour rule for Bachelor of Education Degrees and the Bachelor of Integrated Studies Degree. The discussion was led by Kelly Erby on the proposal to remove the requirement of the CAS credits for Bachelor of Education and the Bachelor of Integrated Studies

- a. Due to the move of the Education Department from CAS to the School of Applied Studies, it is difficult for students to complete the said requirement without going over the 120-credit.
- b. Social Science Division wanted the changes to be separated, and they did not support the change for BIS.
- c. Can we still require a minimum number of credits? Requiring a minimum 72 CAS credits for B.Ed. Majority of NSD support this requirement.
- d. NSD supports the separation of the changes to the two programs.
- e. Since BIS is a CAS degree, there should be a minimum number of hours in CAS.
- f. So far, BIS is not an actively advertised program but used as a parachute program; yet the number of students keeps increasing.
- g. More data and context on BIS will help our discussion.

B. Introduction of the Great-TEXTS certificate program. The division discussed the new program introduced by Kelly Erby.

- a. Sponsored by an engineer who wished he had taken more humanity courses during his undergrad and thought humanity courses can complement his engineer degree better.
- b. Marketed directly to the natural science students (non-humanity majors) and first-gen students. Students will get tuition for the program waived and textbooks for free.
- c. Right now, only 15 students can be admitted into the program due to funding.

We are removing the sentence “No more than five hours of credit will be awarded for MA 141 and/or MA 151”. The Math Department occasionally has students who take MA 141 Applied Calculus for 3 credits and then change their major to one that requires MA 151 Calculus & Analytic Geometry for 5 credits. Historically the Math Department has created a 2 credit MA 299 course for these students. In the MA 299 course, the student attends and is responsible for all homework and exams in the 5 credit MA 151, but only receives 2 credits. This can be a burden to students who want to enroll in 15 credits, but cannot keep up with 18 credits of workload. We want to remove this limit of 5 hours of credit as we believe this will be beneficial to some students. We will also still allow students with MA 141 credit the option of taking a 2 credit MA 299 course if they prefer that option.

We are also correcting a small typo by changing "student" to "students".

The Math Department occasionally has students who take MA 141 Applied Calculus for 3 credits and then change their major to one that requires MA 151 Calculus & Analytic Geometry for 5 credits. Historically the Math Department has created a 2 credit MA 299 course for these students. In the MA 299 course, the student attends and is responsible for all homework and exams in the 5 credit MA 151, but only receives 2 credits. This can be a burden to students who want to enroll in 15 credits, but cannot keep up with 18 credits of workload. We want to remove this limit of 5 hours of credit as we believe this will be beneficial to some students. We will also still allow students with MA 141 credit the option of taking a 2 credit MA 299 course if they prefer. Also, the course description for MA 141 says that it is not open to students with credit in MA 151 so there is no concern over a student completing MA 151 and then enrolling in MA 141.

- Kim Morse is not comfortable with dropping 84-hour requirement for BIS given the challenges of the current moment at WU and all of the changing conditions at the college—BEEd is a done deal already
 - Kelly Erby suggested that we consider BEEd and BIS separately because they are largely two separate issues and BEEd is water under the bridge

 - Michael McGuire added context saying that this may be a good way to make sure multiple departments are represented in Senate

2. This program requires MA 151 which has a prerequisite of MA 117 or MA 123 or an ACT Math score of 28 (or higher) or a satisfactory math placement exam score. Depending on the student's level of readiness in mathematics, the total number of credits may be higher than 120.

We have updated our curriculum to better fit with the direction the field of Psychology is moving and the new faculty that we have hired. PY 305 Sensation and Perception will remain in our curriculum as an elective but will no longer be a core requirement. Instead, PY 326 Health Psychology will be paired with our PY 307 Physiological Psychology course as one pillar of our major's core requirements. Similarly, PY 309 Personality will remain as an elective in our curriculum but will no longer be a core requirement. Instead, our new course, PY 311 Multicultural Psychology, will be paired with our PY 310 Social Psychology course as one pillar of our major's core requirements.
