Overall Reflection


As noted below, FTAF met on May 09, 2022 to reflect together on the assessment and our plan. While we did solidify several new pieces of the plan, we are pleased to report that everything seems to be working well.

Faculty Collaboration

FTAF met on January 13, 2022 and May 09, 2022 to discuss how the program was proceeding and review our assessment plan. At the January meeting, we discussed: a) how we would gather, store, and report assessment data, b) our threshold measurements for direct measures (student artifacts) and indirect measures (senior exit survey), and c) our rubric assessment values. We made changes to b and c. At the May meeting, we created an assessment calendar and also scheduled the rotation of assessment coordinators among faculty. Current Assessment Coordinator, Dr. Jason Miller, offered to create a series of pages in our Anthropology OneNote Notebook where other faculty could see the plan more easily and clarify what faculty teaching AN324 and AN490 needed to do each time the courses were taught regarding PSLOs. We also discussed our stakeholder communication and the use of the shared drive for housing assessment data.

Communication & Collaboration with Students

The new assessment plan and changes to the major were shared with students in several ways. First, they were posted on our website and sent to major students via email. Second, we met with students at advising appointments and at the "Major Meetup" in the fall to share changes and the work we were doing. We also met with the SOAN club in October where we shared the results of our work and solicited feedback. Finally, we also surveyed graduating students for feedback on the program. While the graduating senior survey is not one of the PSLO assessment measures, it does help us better understand our students and their experiences in the



program and provides an opportunity for students to provide anonymous feedback. Finally, we share information about the department with internal and external stakeholders twice a year through our departmental newsletter.

Communication & Collaboration with External Stakeholders

We have discussed our program and outcomes with off campus groups such as the Kansas Historical Society (where we have a long partnership and a proven track record of placing student interns) and plan to use those relationships to further explore what "external stakeholders" will look like for us as a major. Dr. Sundal, department chair, communicates directly with the external stakeholders and sends them semester updates along with the department newsletters. We have also added the revised Program Assessment plan, including the revised mission and PSLOs/measures, to the departmental webpage and Facebook pages now that they have been approved. In addition, we share information about the department with internal and external stakeholders twice a year through our departmental newsletter.

Communication & Collaboration with University

We have discussed our program and outcomes with other groups on campus (e.g., African American and African Diaspora Studies and Museum and Curatorial Studies) and routinely via CAS division, college, and department chairs meetings. Two of the BA Program Revision Committee members have been in touch with the Assessment Director regarding revisions to the program and assessment plans. The revision committee chair and BA assessment liaison, Dr. Miller, also attended an Assessment training workshops during AY21-22. In addition, we share information about the department with internal and external stakeholders twice a year through our departmental newsletter.

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
