SOCIAL SCIENTISTS AT THE FOREFRONT



In summer 2022, Dr. Laura Murphy's students in AN372/KS399 Archaeological Field School teamed up with the Kansas State Historical Society and the Kansas Anthropological Association for excavations at the Brown v. Board of Education National Historical Park site. Washburn students spent two weeks putting their archaeological skills to work as they were able to dig, trowel, measure, map, photograph, and collect artifacts for lab analysis as part of their class. At the end of the field school, students presented a summary of their work at the department's Archaeological Field School Open House.







Collaboration from the field site continued into the fall semester with a roundtable discussion, "Broadening Brown's Impact: Toward Inclusive Pedagogies in Archaeological Research" at the Michael Tilford Conference on Diversity and Multiculturalism. The roundtable focused on inclusive pedagogies and strategies for continued community engagement and the importance of Black voices in archaeological interpretation. Presenters included Dr. Laura Murphy, Nikki Klarmann, Interim State Archeologist at the Kansas State Historical Society, and B.A. in Anthropology students Kiwenke Hubbard, Lisa Larson, and Tori Shaw (featured in the above photos from left to right respectively; top photo features Dr. Laura Murphy with Ray Cwach and El Miller, both B.A. in Anthropology majors).

Bods' Adventures in and out of the Classroom








Students in our Sociology and Anthropology classes this semester had numerous hands-on educational opportunities!

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: Maegan Leavendusky, B.A .Anthropology '21

After graduating with my B.A. in Anthropology in May of 2021, I immediately began graduate school at Miami University. I am pursuing a Master's in Biology with a focus on primate education and conservation. I traveled to Belize and studied black howler monkeys and spider monkeys while I also learned about tapirs, manatees, and community-based conservation. This last summer, I had a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity where I traveled to Borneo. There I studied orangutans, proboscis monkeys, macaques, and silver-leaf monkeys. Additionally, I saw Bornean pygmy elephants, hornbills, crocodiles, monitor lizards, and the extremely rare pangolin. I witnessed and experienced community-based conservation by planting trees, making fish traps, and working with the local schools. I realized the extreme importance of working with local communities for conservation efforts. My passion is primate education, and my vision is creating primate education that will have a global reach and impact primate populations ensuring their protection, conservation, and survival. I currently work as a researcher with GLOBIO, an environmental organization committing raising awareness for primate species.

SOAN Faculty in the Spotlight

❖ Dr. Lindsey Ibañez had a book review published in Social Forces (Living on the Edge: When Hard Times Become a Way of Life by Celine-Marie Pascale). She won a CTEL curriculum development grant to create a lesson plan using archival materials from the Kansas Studies collection at Mabee Library, and also won a CTEL small grant for professional development to attend teaching sessions at a regional sociology conference.



- ❖ Dr. Alexandra Klales was awarded federal funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Institute of Justice as co-PI on a three-year grant project "Sex Estimation in Forensic Anthropology: Taking a Legally-Informed Approach to Method Development." She also received funding through the Forensic Science Foundation's Douglas M. Lucas Grant for a smaller research project, "Statistical Evaluation of Kerf Shape and Size Variation with Implications for Saw Mark Analysis," with colleagues. She gave an invited webinar on Sex Estimation and her MorphoPASSE Program to over 150 participants from over 9 countries for the National Institute of Justice's Forensic Technology Center of Excellence program hosted by the Society of Forensic Anthropologists.
- ❖ Dr. Ashley Maxwell took a road trip through New Mexico Summer 22, completing an item on her bucket list: Chaco Culture National Historical Park. She also presented a poster, "First-Generation Course Redesign for Cultural Anthropology" at the Michael Tilford Conference on Diversity and Multiculturalism.



- ❖ Dr. Jason Miller presented research about making his introductory anthropology classes more inclusive and accessible to diverse learners in a double panel (that he chaired) at the American Anthropological Association's (AAA) annual meeting. He also led the Society for Visual Anthropology Robert Lemelson Foundation Fellowship program for pre-candidacy doctoral students in visual and multimodal anthropology. At the same AAA conference, Dr. Miller chaired a special session for six 2022 Fellows to present their work.
- ❖ Dr. Laura Murphy attended the American Society for Ethnohistory conference where she participated in the Kansas Association for Native American Educators workshop. At the Geological Society of America's annual meeting, she convened a poster session "Recent Advances in Geoarchaeology." She also co-facilitated a CTEL "WUmester 2023 Planning Workshop" with Dr. Louise Krug (English). The workshop allowed time for faculty to brainstorm how they will incorporate the Spring 2023 theme of "Health and Healing" into their courses.

- In addition to teaching a full course load and serving on committees, Alex Myers successfully completed his Ph.D. in Sociology at the University of Kansas. He passed the defense of his dissertation, "Laboratories of Bureaucracy: The Development of Labor Market Institutions in Wisconsin, 1900-1940" during finals week! Congratulations **Dr. Alex Myers**!!
- ❖ Dr. Sangyoub Park completed research on the changing demographic landscape of Korea and Japan and Korean culture over the summer through the Mary B. Sweet Sabbatical. He presented preliminary findings on Korean multicultural towns at the Brown Bag International Lecture Series. He was actively involved in the International Programs by creating a Sharing Culture learning activity with students in his upper-division sociology class. He also represented Korea at the Celebration of Cultures and organized the first K-Pop event, The BTS Night: Yet to Come in Busan 2022.



❖ Dr. Mary Sundal was awarded the CAS Professional Development Fellowship in summer 2022 for manuscript preparation related to the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning. She presented at the Michael Tilford Conference on Diversity and Multiculturalism on "Challenging the Canon: BIPOC Scholarship at the Syllabi Core." She also presented "Decolonizing Anthropology: Teaching Cultural Diversity through African Literature and Music" at the African Studies Association's annual meeting as part of three panels dedicated to teaching about Africa and the undergraduate and high school levels.
