Course Description

This three-hour course, designed for first-year students, focuses upon information literacy, technology and the transition into the Washburn University Community of Learning. Common themes such as the exploration of study skills, wellness, technology, academic honesty and others will be covered to introduce students to a series of best practices for success.

Why WU 101?

The National Resource Center for the First-Year Experience and Students in Transition reports that 87% of colleges and universities in the United States have some type of first-year experience course. Additionally, the universities in the Kansas Board of Regents system all have some type of first-year programming. The national and regional evidence is clear that WU101 will help students obtain higher rates of success in the transition from high school to university studies.

Learning Outcomes for WU101

- 1. Demonstrate proficiency in Information Literacy and Technology
- 2. Practice academic honesty and exhibit ethical conduct
- 3. Establish membership and engagement in the WU community, through connections to faculty, staff, and students on campus
- 4. Develop effective collegiate study skills and apply these skills to generate an academic success plan
- 5. Develop an understanding of the value of a university education
- 6. Express the importance of globalism and diversity

Instructional Team

WU 101 is different than your other classes because it is facilitated by an instructional success team. Your success team is led by a faculty member who sets academic goals and serves as the team leader. Additionally, your team includes an academic advisor who provides information on academic policies and procedures and works with you to begin academic planning and major/career decision making, a librarian who introduces library resources and helps build information and computer literacy skills, and two peer mentors who serve as role models and peer guides for your transition to college. The instructional team is, by purpose and design, a fully collaborative group in which all members are dedicated to your success as a student.

- Campus Activities: Your college experience should be more than just going to classes and doing assignments. It
 is about trying new things and expanding your horizons. With that in mind, you are asked to participate in at
 least three different enrichment activities outside of class. Examples are: civic activities, plays, lectures, athletic

- Late Assignments: You are responsible for submitting assignments on the due dates discussed in class. Late work will not be accepted. Additionally, you will not be allowed to make up a quiz or exam. There will likely be extra credit opportunities in this course at various times.

Over the course of your first semester you will engage in 5 activities that allow you to -1) Experience a student organization; 2) Participate in a diverse experience; 3) Attend an athletic or artistic event; 4) Learn strategies for your academic success; and, 5) Develop a deeper understanding of financial literacy. You will submit a reflection for each experience in the assigned dropbox: write in paragraph format-- additional instructions exist in D2L.

The Importance of Many Stories Assignment (100 points):

Paper (2 pages, typed, double space, one-inch margins, 12-point professional font): Each student will write a paper that addresses the following questions:

- 1. What is your story? How is your story related to why you came to college? How do you think others perceive you? Do those perceptions of you match your story? (1 page)
- 2. Reflect on how one of your college experiences so far (a class you are taking, a friend you have met, an event you have attended, etc.) has expanded or challenged a view or story you once had, such as a story about a place, a people, a concept, or an issue. (1/2 page- 1 page)
- 3. Finally, explain why the presence of diversity and "many stories" is important to your experience at Washburn. (1/2–1 page)

Information Literacy Assignment (150 points):

For this assignment, you will choose a research topic, compile credible sources about that topic, and finally compose an annotated bibliography of those sources. If you know your major and/or your intended future profession, you should choose a topic that is related to those. If you are unsure about a topic, please consult the librarian in your WU101 course. **Due in D2L by start of class on**.

Final Portfolio Assignment (160 points):

Your Final Portfolio details experiences from your first semester and allows you to reflect on your transition to college life. Detailed information, including directions and expectations is in D2L. **Due in D2L by Success Week.**

Visits for Success Assignment (30 Points):

- 1. You will visit one of your Peer Educators during their scheduled student hours. You are not required to submit anything for this part of the assignments, as your Peer Educator will record your attendance. (10 points).
- 2. You will visit one of your professors in your other classes during their scheduled office hours. You will need to submit a brief recap of your visit and have your professor sign it. The recap sheet is available on D2L. It should be printed out and turned into your WU 101 professor. (20 points).
