Provence Village To Vote on Merger

The election will be conducted in the city hall there, and the polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

If the merger is approved, the council then would adopt a joint resolution bringing Provence Village into the Olathe city limits.

Edgerton Man Admits Role In Clutter Family Slaying

As a youth, he was in several "jams." There was a suspected implication in the robbery of the Edgerton drug store. Then came an arrest on a charge of holding a deer rifle. His record at the Johnson County Sheriff's office shows two prior arrests for illegal possession in September, 1949.

In 1958, he was convicted on a stolen car charge, and sent to the Lansing state penitentiary.

Known with that background, it is difficult for folks in Edgerton to believe that Richard Eugene Hickock, 38, could have participated in one of the most brutal multiple murders in Kansas history.

But Hickock, now being returned to Olathe City from Las Vegas, Nev., has confessed to Kansas Bureau of Investigation agents.

Hickock and Perry, 37, of Las Vegas, were involved in the slaying of four members of the Herbert W. Clutter family near Holcomb last November 15.

Clutter, his wife, son and daughter, were all killed by shotgun blasts in their home. Clutter's throat was cut. For a long period, clues were few in the senseless slaying of the four members of the prominent family.

Then, a tip from a former Clutter neighbor started the investigation which unraveled the mystery, ending with confession by both Hickock and Perry, who were fellow prisoners at Lansing.
