

Assistance Animal Agreement Washburn University

According to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) an "assistance animal" is an animal that works, provides assistance, or performs the tasks for the benefit of a person with a disability, or provides emotional support that alleviates one or more identified symptoms or effects of a person's disability in their housing.

If the University grants an individual's request to live with an Assistance Animal (one animal), the individual is solely responsible for the custody and care of the Assistance Animal and must meet the following requirements. The director of Residential Living or designee will review the assistance animal agreement with the individual making the request and the individual requesting the assistance animal will initial on each line indicating an understanding of the statement.

room fees will apply. In addition, any damages caused by the animal will be the responsibility of the handler to recompense. An air purifier is recommended to reduce allergens. 13. Information about housing accommodations is considered confidential. Residential Living Staff will not share details/information with inquiring parties. Limited information about the presence of the animal will be shared with Washburn University Facilities and Maintenance Staff when maintenance is required. The handler must either be present or have the animal kenneled when maintenance has been requested. 14. The handler of an assistance animal is **responsible for any liability associated with the animal** be it personal damage, property damage, or otherwise. Handlers that reside in residence halls or apartments whose room is carpeted, will be responsible for ensuring the carpet is professionally cleaned at either the end of the academic year, or the end of the handler's stay within the residential facility. Arrangements can be made to have University Facility Services professionally clean the carpet in the room, and in which case, the cost will be passed to the handler. _ 15. If the animal causes substantial physical damage to the property of others, is not housebroken, or poses a direct threat of harm to others that cannot be eliminated or reduced, the resident may be asked to remove the animal from the residence 16. If any animal neglect is suspected, the issue will be reported to the proper local authorities as well as documented and adjudicated by the University's designee. The handler is solely responsible for the health and safety of the animal. The animal should not be left alone in the residence for no more than 4 hours. 17. If any of the above conditions of this agreement are violated, a. The first offense of any of the above listed policies will result in either 1) a written warning and a meeting with the Director of Residential Living or appropriately identified staff member or 2) removal of the animal from university grounds until appropriate behavior and/or concerns can be demonstrated and/or alleviated. The second offense of any of the above listed policies will result in removal of the animal from university grounds until appropriate behavior and/or concerns can be demonstrated and/or alleviated. 18. I understand that Residential Living staff will routinely check the residential dwelling to ensure all requirements are a. The dwelling will be inspected at least once a semester for fleas and ticks. If fleas, ticks, etc. are detected upon inspection, the dwelling will be treated using approved fumigation method by a university approved pest control service. The owner will be billed for all pest treatment expenses. b. Any complaints/concerns received pertaining to the assistance animal will be addressed by the Residential Living staff and discussed with the owner regarding any necessary actions. University Diversity and Inclusion, Human Resources and/or Residential Living may place other reasonable conditions or restrictions on the Assistance Animal depending on the nature, characteristics, and species of the Assistance Animal. I have read and agree to the conditions outlined in this document as they relate to the possession of an assistance animal on campus. I understand that I must abide by the terms of this agreement regarding assistance animals. Failure to abide by the terms and conditions set forth for assistance animals at Washburn University could result in removal of the assistance animal and disciplinary action pursuant to the Student Conduct Code.
